Plans for the next year of programs will be discussed at the meeting. Raffle tickets will be available for pick-up.

If you have not already signed up for the retreat, don't worry, you can still come. Cost is \$10 for 1 day, \$20 for 2 days, and \$25 for 3 days. Food will be potluck, based around BBQs and mostaccioli. Supply information was sent out in a separate e-mail, but if you missed it let me know and I will send it to you. The list is general supplies, but items that are often forgotten.

Anyone wishing to make the binding bag should bring the following materials cut as noted: Bag exterior 8" X 17 $\frac{1}{2}$ " Batting 10"x 20" Bag interior 1 piece cut 7"x11 $\frac{1}{2}$ " and a different piece cut 7"x5 1/2" Zipper pouch – 4 pieces cut at 3 $\frac{1}{4}$ x 7" A polyester zipper at least 9" long Pocket for scissors 5"x2 1/2" - strap for scissors cut 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ " x 3" Goody pocket – cut 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 8" binding for pocket cut at 2" x 7" Tie 1 $\frac{3}{4}$ " x 36" binding for bag 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ x 70" Button 5/8" (don't worry we will not be making buttonholes)

Getting to Know...Kathi Davis

How long have you been a guild member? I became a member of the guild in summer of 2006 and immediately assisted with the quilt show that fall. From there, I edited the newsletter for about 10 years and was the chair of two quilt shows.

How long have you been sewing? I started sewing when I was about 10 years old. I still have the white in-cabinet sewing machine (in my dining room) on which my mom taught me and my sister to sew. I made clothing for myself first. I am the oldest of four siblings and when we wanted new clothes, our parents would give us a certain amount of money. I learned that I could make more clothes than I could buy for the same amount of money. I also enjoyed the "show 'n tell" that wearing new clothes created.

What was your first project? I don't really remember the first project I made. However, I do remember making many outfits during high school. Also, I remember making my own wedding dress and my daughter's wedding dress. I made clothing for my children when they were young. I've recently found out from my 36-year-old son, that when he was little, he was really proud to say that his mom had made his outfit. Why did it take him so long to let me know?

Favorite colors? Duh?!? Purple! I really like the deep eggplant purple and the light lilac purple (not too pinky). The next color in my preference spectrum is yellow and then pale green. Just visit me and use my bathroom...it has those colors.

Least favorite color? Red. Don't know why. And dull browns, greys, beige, etc.

Favorite quilting celebrity? I found Ricky Tims quite interesting. As for a workshop, I liked Frieda Anderson's dyeing class. I'm now beginning to use the fabrics I dyed; I guess I was saving them for a "special" project?!? Anyway, I always like hearing about new techniques and seeing unusual quilts.

What are you currently working on? I'm finishing up a baby quilt for the second granddaughter of another friend, Penny McIntire, that died last December. I made a quilt for her first granddaughter and had planned on making this second one (didn't want to leave her out), but I wasn't able to until recently. I also am working on the Mystery Quilt, several UFOs, and planning a quilt for my oldest, 16, grandson (brother to granddaughter for whom I just finished a quilt). And I am going to remake the curtains for my kitchen by the end of the year. I've had the fabric for two years and the curtains there now have been there since 1992. I'm afraid to touch them for fear they will disintegrate. I also am finishing a wall hanging (started by Margie) for a second of her brothers. After this one, I've one more brother for whom to finish a wall hanging which Margie started.

Any other hobbies or interests? Well, it has been said that "There is not a craft that Margie and I didn't like." That is still true; however, without a partner, I am not trying as many things now-a-days. I've always loved to learn new things. Crafts that I've tried are Zentangles, stain glass, flamework glass beads, tatting, jewelry making, and painting. What I still do are needlepoint, Kumihimo (Japanese braiding), marbling fabric, fabric machine embroidery (have a six-thread semi-professional machine), dyeing fabric using different means, knitting (including broomstick lace), crocheting, and making clothes. I've also done and will do whenever necessary: carpentry (second story on house and deck/screened-in porch), woodworking, and ceramic tiling (again my bathroom). I also garden (very small now) planting not only flowers but basil, kale, cucumbers, peppers, and tomatoes—all in containers or raised beds.
