QUILT LOTTO

Each month a new block will be introduced. Following the directions of size and color, for each block you contribute at our next meeting, your name will be put into a drawing. At the end of the evening, one lucky member will go home with all the blocks for that Month! Remember, there is no pressure. Make as many blocks as you'd like!

The March through May blocks were a pattern courtesy of Jordan fabrics, called Sister's Choice, shown above. Have you made any of these blocks? We hope to raffle them off when we next meet.

For June, we are sharing a free pattern from Moda Block Heads 3 by Robin Pickens called Blooming Love. We will be sewing the 8-inch block for quilt lotto. Use any colors you like for the "flower" and a white or light neutral for the background.





JULY QUILT LOTTO BLOCK

For our next block, I have chosen another block which is easy and fun to do! It is a variation of a Churn Dash with a pinwheel in the center.

To make this block, choose any color (patterned or solid) 10" square and pair it with a plain white 10" square. With right sides together, sew a quarter inch around all 4 sides. Then cut across diagonally in both directions. You will now have 4 half-square triangle blocks. Sew these 4 blocks together to make a pinwheel. Your pinwheel block should measure 12-1/2" square.

Measuring 4" from each edge, make four cuts, like the red lines in the diagram to the right. These cuts will yield 9 blocks:


- 4 half square triangle blocks that are 4" square
- 4 half rectangle blocks measuring 4"x4-1/2"
- 1 pinwheel measuring 4-1/2" square

Trim the center pinwheel down to 4" square by trimming a quarter inch off each side. I did this by centering one of my HST corner blocks on top of the pinwheel and then trimming the edges off.

Next trim all half rectangle blocks down to 4" square by trimming a quarter inch off the dark side and a quarter inch off the light side. Again, I did this by 4" 4-1/2" 4"

centering one of the HST corner blocks on top and trimming a quarter inch off each of two sides only

Finally arrange the nine segments and sew to form the churn dash with a pinwheel center.



GETTING TO KNOW...KAY FREDRICK

How long have you been a guild member? I have been a member of the guild since 1989. I did take a few years off when I went back to school. I have Susie Hughes to thank for introducing me to the guild and quilting.

How long have you been sewing? I have been around sewing my entire life. While I may have not been an active participant all the time, I was often the recipient of a sewing project. My grandmother worked at the Brody's Coat Factory in Elgin. She made all my coats and hats. My aunt worked in the fabric department of Penney's in Elgin. She made my Barbie clothes. Some I still have 59 years later. Both my aunt and grandmother were incredibly talented seamstresses. I am in awe of what they produced on their humble Singer treadle machines. My mom also sewed but she will be the first to admit she was not in their class.



Neither am I. I started sewing on my own after my 7th grade junior high home economics class.

What was your first project? My first quilt project I *finished* was a sampler quilt I made in a class taught by Shirley Gylleck. It is not my best work, but it got me hooked on quilting.

Favorite colors? My favorite color is pink, but not necessarily in quilts. That has changed...I have a new granddaughter. I love making pink baby quilts to the horror of her purple loving mother.

Least favorite color? Brown has never been a color I have been drawn to. It seems so lifeless compared to pink.

Favorite quilting celebrity? My favorite quilting celebrity is Shirley Gylleck! While she is not what you would think of as national celebrity, she taught me the basics of quilting giving her celebrity status in my book.

On what are you currently working? My current project that has the most potential to be finished is Vintage Christmas by Lisa Holt. It was a block of the month last year. I was on track to complete on time, but life got in the way. I have 39 of the 42 blocks completed.

Any other hobbies or interests? My granddaughter is a priority on my list of other interests. We also just got a new puppy. I am not sure what we were thinking. Puppy is a full-time job and limits my time for sewing. My husband and I were looking forward to travelling this year but obviously that is on hold. For now, reading and working on the house keep me busy.
