GENEROSITY

As part of the generosity project, DCQG donates baby quilts to the NICU center at Mercy Hospital (formally Rockford Memorial Hospital) in Rockford, IL. The preferred size that Mercy would like them to be is 47" x 54". A quilt is given to each new infant that is a patient in the NICU center and is partly used by the parents to help identify the location of their child. As the infants' progress with their health/development, they are moved to various parts of the NICU, and thus the parents can locate them better. The quilt will remain with the infant and help to keep him or her warm, as well as help protect their eyes from the lights.

I know we have received sizes smaller than this, but I have not had any quilt returned, and I know they do get used.

Remember that each quilt should have a label attached to the back and you can either make your own or go to our website (DCQG.org) and print your own label. Remember that a laser printer will not work on this label, as it is set up for an ink-jet printer. Also, should you need batting for the quilt, you may go to Carolyn Canon's business, MCR Framing on Lincoln Highway in DeKalb, and get what you need. The guild has several rolls there for your use.

I will be glad to receive your quilt at each meeting and take it to Mercy for you. Should I not be available, I will try to keep you informed if I must miss a meeting.

Thank you, members, for all your hard work in completing a baby quilt for the NICU.


Getting to Know... Jennifer Olbrich

In the last couple newsletters, I have introduced you to ideas that I've come upon to make my quilting easier – the

"Easy 8" and "Dividends" were two that I have shared. At our last workshop, Bobbie shared a great technique to make half square triangles where no two are alike. The videos are also shared on our Facebook page! Since then, I've used that technique to begin work on a quilt top that will be a great Christmas Quilt for one of my grandsons.

This month, with the permission she granted, I would like to introduce you all to Peg Spradlin from Cozad, Nebraska, and her brilliant quilting technique called "Fold & Sew". I came upon this one day while surfing the net and believe me it was a life changer. For many years, like Peg, I'd been collecting pre-cuts at various quilt shops



and I have an enormous collection of charms, candies, and layer cakes. Peg's simple but brilliant concept gave me tons of inspiration for using those pre-cuts in a super easy but creative way that is just the thing for anyone interested in taking a break from very difficult or technically challenging piecing...or anyone who hates rotary cutting.

In 2014, Peg introduced this method while sewing for Quiltmaker Magazine and the rest, as they say, is history. Hopefully, you will be motivated to go online, check out her videos and see just how versatile this technique is.



The idea is simple. Take a layer cake square, put a charm square on top of it, then fold each side of the 10" piece over the 5" pre-cut and sew a ¼" seam encasing the smaller squares raw edges. Then fold back the 10" edges, revealing the encased square. The basic idea of "fold & sew can be built upon to make tons of designs by varying the location of the smaller square on the larger, and instructions can be found at <u>www.handicraftsbypeg.com</u> or by searching for Peg Spradlin on the Internet.

The Sarah's Grove Quilters' Circle is excited to welcome Valli Schiller, an award-winning fiber artist from Naperville, IL, who will offer her class, "Folk Art Free Motion Quilting" on Sat., Nov. 10, 2018, from 9:30 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. (with a break for lunch). The class will be taught at the Shorewood Bible Church, 1900 Hicks, Rolling Meadows, IL.

CLASS DESCRIPTION: Go BOLD with your free motion quilting! Learn how freehand doodles can take simple shapes from basic to breathtaking. You'll get hands-on free motion quilting practice on a whimsical 16"x 22" whole cloth quilt (pattern provided) that you'll finish at home. You choose your own background and border fabrics. The stitching techniques you learn can be applied to any future quilting project.

SKILL LEVEL: Confident Beginner to Intermediate

To get the most out of this class, Valli advises that you need working knowledge of free motion quilting. You should already be comfortable with installing a free motion foot, dropping the feed dogs, setting automatic needle down, and making thread tension adjustments on your machine. You should also be able to free motion quilt along a marked line, and do freehand stippling/meandering.

SIGN-UPS are underway. The class will cost \$55 per student (non-guild members) for 6 hours of instruction, and includes the pattern (pictured above). Class size for this workshop is limited and pre-registration is required. For workshop registration and supply lists, please contact Ann Kelly, annk220@att.net
